Last month I indicated that I hoped we would be getting a new toilet suite in Church during the year. We received plans from our architect in time for the January PCC meeting, and duly resolved to apply for a “faculty” (that is, the church equivalent of planning permission) to carry out the work. It will be a couple of months before the paperwork is sorted out and we can begin ~ but it’s a start!

As I said last month, we need to raise money for this job, since it is not something for which we can claim grants, and I shall be writing to church members, and those who have had baptisms or weddings in the church recently, appealing for help. We are also very grateful for gifts and offers already received. If you wish to give for this project, please make cheques out to St.Wilfrid’s PCC, but send them to me, marked *church toilet fund* or something like that, and (in accordance with Charity Law) I will keep this “restricted” fund separate from the ordinary church accounts. If there is a surplus, I suggest it should go towards the church’s share of the *Hall* toilet improvements.

As for those improvements in the Hall, which will also include more accessible fire escape doors and ramps, and a platform lift to enable wheelchair users to get up into the main hall freely, I am in the process of getting quotations from local contractors for this work. We have planning permission for this, and it will go ahead, I hope, as soon as an acceptable quote is received and grants confirmed. The contractors have been asked to phase their work so that the hall can be kept in use even while the work is being done, and they reckon this is possible.

Just a brief note to ask those of you who placed Christmas wreaths on family graves to remove them now. The "Christmas" season ends on 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb., and by now the wreaths themselves are beginning to blacken anyway, and rot. Plastic flowers and wreaths too will be removed once they start looking dowdy.

One client compared it to a makeover show, with his gifts of new clothes from the hard-working team at the "clothes store" who supply everything from shoes to hats, rucksacks and towels and everything else in between.

There are some very interesting clients: Ian\* who has been shot three times and lost two fingers; Umar who is gay and has been kicked out by all his family from the Oldham area and is not allowed ever to return; Paul, a lovely old bloke, who likes to have his head shaved and is generally pleased to see me again and asks for the same style as last year; Janey who just has a trim and a good laugh with a few of us, and is really pleased with

her hair; and “Big Lizzie”, as she calls herself, who is delighted that someone cuts her hair properly and gives her some style.

What a refreshing way to spend an odd half day at Christmas, with so many deserving people! You come away feeling pleased with your work. We shall return in the following week, and for years to come.
