A prayer for the High Court of Parliament ~

based on a prayer in the Book of Common Prayer

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Dear Friends,

You will know the double edged Chinese blessing: may you live in interesting times. We seem to be living in interesting political and perhaps economic times at present, with a coalition government, no money in the kitty, and talk of changes to the voting system. First a word about coalitions. You will also know the other cliché, attributed to P. T. Barnum, I believe, about not being able to please all of the people all of the time. Well, it is in the nature of a coalition that you cannot please all of your own people all of the time; you have to be content with pleasing some people some of the time, and different people at different times. You have to play with the hand you are dealt. We should not criticise it for compromising.

I am unhappy that some of the cautious rationalisation proposed by the Liberal Democrats in connection with Asylum

Seekers ~ sanctuary seekers ~ will not be implemented. They matched points made in a Church of England General Synod resolution about 16 months ago, which grew out of grass-roots parish experience of how genuine sanctuary seekers get treated in our inhumane system. I will have to live with that (and continue niggling about it, perhaps) until next time, but the alternative might have been a currency dropping through the floor, or elections every six months till the Olympics.

Our local MP, Paul Goggins, held his seat with a reduced majority. He loses his other job, of course, as a minister in the Northern Ireland Office. I want to express appreciation to him for that work especially, which he has carried out without too much publicity, but which has been vital for the Province. In a sense he lost a core part of that job before the election, since he was responsible for justice and the police until the local politicians took over in April. For this and much else he deserves our gratitude, whichever way we voted.

I am torn as to what to say about the local council election. Richard Cowell has worked hard and with obvious concern not just for Northenden, but also for Environmental issues in the City as a whole. I am grateful for his interest and encouragement, for instance, in connection with the ideas we have for a hydro-generator on the weir, and am sorry to see him voted out. But I have also valued the support of Mary DiMauro in that and other ideas in and around the Parish, and so wish her well for her future role as councillor here.

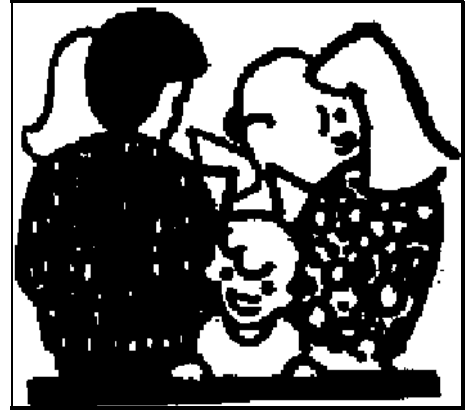

Magpie ...

C H R I S T I A N A I D

As usual, the deadline for Concord has arrived before we have final figures for Christian Aid Week collections. I have just put £417 in the bank, in round bagged amounts, with £200+ of odd coins locked away; I am still waiting for collectors to bring in their results, and expect another £700+ through collectors from St.Hilda's and the Methodists. Thank you all for your efforts and generosity. I will announce the final total when I have it.

One of the encouraging things this year is the number of donations which have been Gift-Aided. This adds a further 25% to the gift, thanks to the tax that Christian Aid can reclaim. This means about £40 extra to what I have banked already.

F A I R R E P R E S E N T A T I O N

I quoted one General Synod resolution earlier. Let me quote another, dating from 1976. It called for a fairer way of electing parliamentary representatives ~ fairer than a "first past the post" system, in which in a close (say) five candidate race someone could win with only 20.1% of the vote. At this election it was calculated that one party could have got well under 25% of the total vote, but obtained nearly half the seats, and another receive over 30% of votes, and get less than a sixth of the seats.

That last point can be addressed by sorting out the size of constituencies, but the injustice remains. In its own voting the church works with multi-member constituencies ~ dioceses ~ and asks voters to list candidates in order of preference. Then, by a fairly easy calculation, second and further choices get included until all seats are filled by people with the widest level of support. How that would work with an electorate of millions I do not know, but people who know more about it than me reckon it is possible.

The drawback is that you then lose the close link between members and constituencies, which are small enough for them to know and work in. The strength is that individual characters, perhaps who do not belong to a specific party, or representatives of smaller parties such as the Greens, can get elected. That should be a possibility built into any system, otherwise we are dependent on party lists of party apparatchiks.

Indebted !
